The Gospel Journey Luke 9:51–62

In Luke's gospel, this morning's reading marks a change. The previous six chapters (4:14-9:50) tell of the ministry of Jesus in the region of Galilee. From synagogue to synagogue he teaches and preaches. From town to town he heals the sick. Along the way he gathers disciples. A grass roots Galilean movement grows around this rabbi from Nazareth.

Earlier in chapter 9, Jesus feeds 5,000 with but a few loaves and fishes (9:10-17). Peter "sort of" figures out that Jesus is the Messiah, and says so, though Jesus warns him to be quiet about this, for dark days lie ahead (9:18-27). There is a bight moment when Peter, James, and John see him transfigured with Moses and Elijah on a mountain, but it is only a fleeting glimpse (9:28-36). He heals a boy troubled by an unclean spirit, and people are astounded by God's greatness (9:37-45). However, Jesus quickly clarifies that "the least among you is the greatest," with a child by his side (9:46-48).

And then, immediately before our morning's reading, the disciple named John speaks up that someone not in their circle was casting out demons in Jesus' name. "Should we stop him," John asks. "No," replies Jesus, "whoever is not against you is for you" (9:49-50). Thus we come to a pivotal moment in Luke's gospel when Jesus shifts from what he has been doing in Galilee, and turns in a new direction. It is like a destination is typed into a good news GPS. No more messing around in familiar territory among people like "us." In this passage Jesus and his disciples are headed on a journey now toward his destiny. Though there are many twists and turns along the way, the road leads toward ... Jerusalem."

(put a "Jerusalem" sign around neck, and read while walking through congregation, stopping at different persons, speaking as if they were the ones asking the questions)

⁵¹ When the days drew near for Jesus to be taken up, <u>he set his face to go to Jerusalem</u>. ⁵² And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready for him; ⁵³ but they did not receive him, because <u>his face was set toward</u> <u>Jerusalem</u>.⁵⁴ When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" ⁵⁵ But he turned and rebuked them. ⁵⁶ Then they went on to another village....

⁵⁷ As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." ⁵⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head."

⁵⁹ To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." ⁶⁰ But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God."

⁶¹ Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." ⁶² Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God."

Returning our Tithes and Offerings

As you return your offering just now, think over this past week. Did Jesus call you to follow him at any point? Maybe not out loud, but in some way that your conscience got tweaked. Perhaps it was in an interaction with a coworker or neighbor, when your mind or body pulled in one direction and God pulled in another. An inner voice could have nudged you to reach deeper, to move beyond surface talk about the weather or politics. Something may have told you to really connect with this person, which possibly they – and you – needed. Were there any such "Jesus calling" moments this week? If so, ponder how you responded. Talk to God about it as the plates are passed. Then we'll stand and sing a verse, and pray together – dedicating not only the offering, but also this week, to the One who calls, "follow me." ... Ushers?

Everlasting God, you never ask us to wait when we cry out in despair. You are ever-present. You provide counsel in our bleakest moments. You share joy in our celebratory times. We confess that sometimes we are reluctant in our relationship with you. We do not desire to be the "would-be" followers of Jesus, like Luke describes. Help us to be committed totally to you in the days ahead. We rededicate ourselves to you and share a portion of our financial earnings with you. We pray in Jesus' name.

Galatians 5:1, 13-25

(Before the service begins, give this sheet to 9 persons scattered throughout the sanctuary. They are to follow along, and at the right moment speak their highlighted word loudly – with almost a yell so all can plainly hear. In so doing they indicate that this fruit of the Spirit grows out of the soil of the congregation.)

¹For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

¹³ For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. ¹⁴ For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." ¹⁵ If, however, you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another.

¹⁶Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh.¹⁷For what the flesh desires is opposed to the Spirit, and what the Spirit desires is opposed to the flesh; for these are opposed to each other, to prevent you from doing what you want. ¹⁸But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not subject to the law.

¹⁹Now the works of the flesh are obvious: fornication, impurity, licentiousness, ²⁰ idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, anger, quarrels, dissensions, factions, ²¹ envy, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these. I am warning you, as I warned you before: those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God.

²² By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love,

peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³ gentleness, and self-control.

There is no law against such things. ²⁴ And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. ²⁵ If we live by the Spirit, let us also be guided by the Spirit.
