Scripture as Call

Colossians 1:1-14 (adapted)

We begin worship this morning with the first 14 verses of Paul's letter to the church in Colossae. Instead of hearing these words speaking to a group of long-ago believers located in a strange sounding town in a land far distant from our own, I encourage you to listen as if this letter was addressed to us. To that end, a few words (two, to be exact) have been altered, so that we might adapt this scripture into an invitation to us, to step into the call of Christ here and now. May these words awaken us, that we might arise to new life this very hour, as if we were stepping out of the waters of baptism, or exiting the empty tomb. Be called forth by God. Listen!

(From) ¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, ² To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in *Long Green Valley*:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

³ In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, ⁴ for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, ⁵ because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel ⁶ that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. ⁷ This you learned from *Pete*, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, ⁸ and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

⁹ For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, ¹⁰ so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. ¹¹ May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.*

Rise, now, in body or spirit, and let us together sing #99: "We praise thee, O God"

Scripture as Commandment Deuteronomy 30:9-14

From the Torah, the commandments of God passed down through Moses, we hear this scripture from Deuteronomy. It is not so much a "do this" or "don't do that" form of commandment. This word from God invites us to realize how near we are to the One from whom these words flow. Yes, the Lord is God, the Lord alone, and we are to have no other gods, nor graven images. And we are to treat each other with a "10 commandments" kind of respect. But these are not impossible ideals far beyond our ability to understand or undertake. For the One we are to love with heart, soul, and might; the One who calls us to love our neighbor as our self, is as close to us as our very breath, and God's word is engraved upon our heart. Listen to this scripture as a new kind of commandment.

⁹ The LORD your God will help you succeed in everything you do—in your own fertility, your livestock's offspring, and your land's produce—everything will be great! Because the LORD will once again enjoy doing good things for you just as he enjoyed doing them for your ancestors, ¹⁰ and because you will be obeying the LORD your God's voice, keeping his commandments and his regulations that are written in this Instruction scroll, and because you will have returned to the LORD your God with all your heart and all your being.

¹¹ This commandment that I'm giving you right now is definitely not too difficult for you. It isn't unreachable. ¹² It isn't up in heaven somewhere so that you have to ask, "Who will go up for us to heaven and get it for us that we can hear it and do it?" ¹³ Nor is it across the ocean somewhere so that you have to ask, "Who will cross the ocean for us and get it for us that we can hear it and do it?" ¹⁴ Not at all! **The word is very close to you. It's in your mouth and in your heart, waiting for you to do it.**

Returning our Tithes and Offerings

God's commandments are not "*up in heaven somewhere*," nor "*across the ocean somewhere*" (Dt. 31:12-13). As the prophet Jeremiah promised, speaking for the Lord: "*I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people*" (Jer. 31:33). Indeed, this "*word is very close to you*. *It's in your mouth and in your heart, waiting for you to do it*" (Dt. 30:14).

Speaking of "doing," now is the time to return to the Lord our monetary offerings for the ministries of this church. As you give, remember that this is not a payment for someone else to do what God wants for you to do. The desire and the ability are there – "*in your mouth and in your heart, waiting for you to do it.*" … Amen. May it be so.

Scripture as Story

Luke 10:25-37

We turn now to our gospel story for today. It is, perhaps, one of the most familiar of Jesus' parables. Like most good stories, we hear something new every time we truly listen to it. In this scripture, Jesus is asked an important question. Being the good rabbi, or teacher, that he was, Jesus first returned the question to the one who asked it, then he tossed out a story.

By the way, the word "parable" comes from the Latin word, "parabola," which means, "comparison." "*The kingdom of God is like*...," Jesus often said before launching into a parable. Now, in mathematical terms, a "parabola" is a curved line between two points equal distance from another line. Imagine, if you will, throwing a ball into the air. Instead of keeping your eyes on the ground after the toss, you focus on the arc this ball takes to get from one place to another. In a similar way, Jesus tossed out his stories, which make us pay attention to their arc. This "parabola" (if you will) flies over the question that led to the story, and ends up at a different place.

As you listen to what may be a very familiar scripture for you, pay fresh attention to the arc of the story Jesus tosses out. What words seem to grab you? Is there something new in this scripture to which you never really paid attention before? Or, maybe, something you once heard, but discarded, returns to your awareness. In other words, listen with new ears, and be prepared to share what you see and hear. I will begin my sermon with your responses. Understood? ... Well then, let all who have ears, hear... ²⁵ Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" ²⁶ (Jesus) said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" ²⁷ (*The lawyer*) answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." ²⁸ And (Jesus) said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live." ²⁹ But wanting to justify himself, (the lawyer) asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" ³⁰ Jesus replied. "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers. who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. ³¹Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. ³² So likewise a Levite. when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side.

³³But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him. he was moved with pity. ³⁴ He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. ³⁵ The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' ³⁶ Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" ³⁷ (*The lawyer*) said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him. "Go and do likewise."

Invitation

(the end of the sermon)

And the Samaritan traveler saw the wounded man. Compassion led him to cross the road and provide care. Not only that, he took responsibility for this man's recovery, taking him to a place of hospitality, the closest thing to a "hospital" in that day. Then he provided the means for this broken man's long-term care, promising whatever it took to restore him to health.

We say it was God's compassion that sent Jesus to cross over to our side of the road and care for us, not just in a quick fix sort of way, but long term. He took upon himself our wounds. That's what real love does. "*This is my body*," Jesus said as he broke the bread with his discipleship on the night before his crucifixion. (move the bread from the worship center to the smaller table closer to the congregation) His body was broken, like that of the man who "fell into the hands of robbers."

"This is my blood," Jesus also said as he lifted the cup on that long-ago night. *(move the juice from the worship center to the smaller table closer to the congregation)* The prophet Isaiah said of the suffering servant, *"he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed"* (53:5).

We come to a time of communion, a time to remember the arc of God's salvation story. It's not just a story about someone else, however. We have questions. *"What must I do to inherit eternal life?"* We speak what we know. "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And we question further. "Who is my neighbor?" And the Lord parables us – we become part of the story.

We are the beaten and broken, whom Jesus came to heal. We are the hypocrites who look away. We are astounded by the most unlikely persons God chooses to use in treating the wounded of this world, the "Samaritans" we least expect to be the hands of Jesus. And, wonder of wonders, we even become part of the healing mission, being the once hated, now unexpected "Samaritan" to someone else. Yes, as we break bread and drink from the cup of Christ, we remember and partake in the arc of God's saving grace.

I have purposely moved the bread and cup from its usual place for 2 reasons. First, I do so to emphasize that I (your pastor) do not stand between you and God. I am not your mediator. Jesus is. And in the Holy Spirit, Christ is right smack dab in the middle of you all, tending your wounds, restoring you to wholeness, empowering you to walk with new life in your step, following Jesus.

My second reason for moving the bread and cup is so that I can accompany your singing on guitar, thus giving our organist the opportunity to simply participate in communion herself, instead of having to play. The deacons will do their job and pass the plates of bread, and later, the cup. As they do so, please turn in your hymnal to #493, and let us sing together, "I heard the voice of Jesus say."

 - what Jesus taught and did,


