Call to Worship

Psalm 15

1 - Terri, 2 - Pete

Pete:

We begin worship this day with the 15th Psalm, as paraphrased by a Baptist pastor in Melbourne, Australia. The words call us to be real with God. Please rise and listen...

- 1 - *LORD, who is welcome at your table?*
- 2 - *Who can stay in the place you call your own?*
- 1 - *You have given us the answer, LORD.*
- 2 - *It is those who walk with integrity
and do the right thing;*
- 1 - *those who speak the honest truth
and do not use their words to wound;*
- 2 - *those who do not exploit their friends
or put down their neighbors.*
- 1 - *It is those who hate corruption and look up
to those who honor you, LORD;*
- 2 - *those who give their word and stand by it
even if it costs them;*
- 1 - *those who lend freely, without seeking a profit,
and cannot be bribed into shafting the innocent.*
- 2 - *You honor such people, LORD, and anchor them
on unshakable ground.*

Terri:

Happiness can be a fleeting emotion, but when God gracefully anchors us *on unshakable ground*, we can't help but be joyful... Plant your feet and lift up your voice, brothers and sisters in Christ. Let's sing together #83, the words of which are both in your hymnal and on the screen.

Opening Prayer

O God, your handiwork is all around, blessing us in a multitude of ways. We don't have to step outside on a starry night to be filled with wonder, or stand before some great mountain to be in awe. So often, Lord, it is in the smallest of things that we behold your glory ... and we are blessed.

Thank you.

You have drawn us to this place and time. We dare to imagine ourselves at your table, a feast spread before us. Your "Word" we call "our daily bread." And there is plenty for everyone. As we eat the spiritual food you provide, however, we confess that we are not all that you would have us be. Not really. Our integrity is questionable at times. The honest truth is not always upon our lips. All-too-easily we can put down others, with words or actions, even those closest to us. When wounded, we hit back. Or worse, we sometimes inflict a pre-emptive strike of pain. Thus, we question whether we are really welcome at your table...

If not for the One who said, "*this is my body, broken for you,*" we would quietly walk away. And yet, in Christ Jesus we behold your arms open wide, and we are embraced beyond forgiveness with a Love that knows no boundaries ... and we are blessed.

Thank you.

So, bless this time. May we be more aware of your presence. Breathe into us your Holy Spirit. Help these feet to follow Jesus, whom we call our Teacher, our Savior, our Friend. It is in his name that we pray to you, Holy God. Amen.

Pastoral Prayer

Speaking God's prophet

From the book of Psalms, we turn to the words of the prophet Micah. We will both speak and sing this passage of scripture, passed down to us through many generations.

Now, you can either turn to the back of your hymnal to #753, or follow along on the screen. Likewise, you will find the music to the song, "What does the Lord require," on your bulletin insert. The words will be on the screen. Some of us sang this before the service.

The responsive reading begins with "All" of us. Shall we speak the words of God's prophet together?

ALL: *With what shall I come before the Lord,
and bow myself before God on high?*

People: **Shall I come before God with burnt offerings,
with calves a year old?**

Leader: Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams,
with ten thousands of rivers of oil?

People: **Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression,
the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?**

ALL: *God has told you, O mortal, what is good;
and what does the Lord require of you
but to do justice,
and to love kindness,
and to walk humbly with your God?*
