John 10:1-10

Our gospel scripture this morning is from the tenth chapter of John, verses one to ten. The Sunday School class which meets in the library focused upon these words last week. From what I heard, they learned much from Lucille Groves, who grew up on a farm in western Maryland raising sheep... As you listen to Jesus, imagine....

1 "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. ² The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³ The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴ When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵ They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers."

⁶ Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. ⁷ So again Jesus said to them,

"Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸ All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹ I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. ¹⁰ The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."

Psalm 23

Perhaps the most familiar scripture in the Bible is the 23rd Psalm. Because of this, let's see how much of it we have memorized. If you have not yet committed it to memory, we challenge you to do so, for it often is very helpful in times of distress. Many have faced into the anxiety of an impending surgery, or other difficult experiences, but pulling portions of this Psalm, or other memorized scriptures, from the heart, and speaking them over and over inwardly.

Just now, let's try saying it out loud, together. After we have spoken a line, or as we speak, it will appear on the screen. Don't be thrown off if you have not memorized it in the same translation as others.... Let's draw on the well of our faith together...

¹ The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want;

² he makes me lie down in green pastures.

He leads me beside still waters;

³ he restores my soul.

He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

⁴ Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death,

I fear no evil; for thou art with me;

thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me.

⁵ Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of my enemies;

thou anointest my head with oil,

my cup overflows.

⁶ Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life;

and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD for ever.

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(postscript to Psalm 23 reading)

An actor once told of an experience honoring an old priest from the village where he was born. During the course of the evening he was asked to recite the 23rd Psalm. When he completed the recitation, the audience applauded in recognition of his eloquent expression of this beautiful passage from the Bible. Then the actor asked the old priest who was being honored at the occasion to stand and recite the 23rd Psalm. When the old priest finished, there was no applause but a reverent hush fell over the entire audience until the actor said respectfully: "I know the 23rd Psalm, but he knows the shepherd."

Let us enter into this time of sharing as those who seek to more fully know the Shepherd, and to trust in his rod and staff, as we lift up those in need of shepherding (including ourselves). May we also share about the "table times" this past week when we experienced God's joy.

Prayer of God's people

In our hymnal is an intercessory prayer, which makes space within it for moments of silence. (A time for silent intercessory prayer)

For those who know that they must shortly die and for those who cannot wait to die.

We now lift up our voices in unison...

(forward slide)

ALL:

Come, Redeeming God, take all these sufferings upon yourself and transform them.

Be merciful also to us, who offer these prayers, so that we might enter the sufferings of others and become agents of your healing love, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. AMEN
