A Gospel Story

Matthew 16:21-28

If you were here last Sunday, do you recall the gospel story we read? It comes right before today's story from Matthew. In it, Jesus asked his disciples what they had heard from the crowds. His question: "who do they think I am?" He then flipped it and asked, "who do you think I am?" In his best moment before Jesus died and rose, Peter responded, "You are the Messiah, the Son of God." In almost the next breath comes one of Peter's worst moments. In the gospel of Mark, it happens immediately after. Matthew puts a bit more space between Peter's highest confession and his complete misunderstanding of the gospel. But it's still there. Listen

(pause)

- 1 ²¹ From then on, Jesus began telling his disciples what would happen to him. He said,
- 2 "I must go to Jerusalem. There the nation's leaders, the chief priests, and the teachers of the Law of Moses will make me suffer terribly. I will be killed, but three days later I will rise to life."
- 1 ²² Peter took Jesus aside and told him to stop talking like that. He said.
- 2 "God would never let this happen to you, Lord!"

(pause)

- 1 ²³ Jesus turned to Peter and said,
- 2 "Satan, get away from me! You're in my way because you think like everyone else and not like God."
- 1 ²⁴ Then Jesus said to his disciples:
- 2 If any of you want to be my followers, you must forget about yourself. You must take up your cross and follow me. ²⁵ If you want to save your life, you will destroy it. But if you give up your life for me, you will find it. ²⁶ What will you gain, if you own the whole world but destroy yourself? What would you give to get back *vour soul?*

²⁷ The Son of Man will soon come in the glory of his Father and with his angels to reward all people for what they have done. ²⁸ I promise you that some of those standing here will not die before they see the Son of Man coming with his kingdom.

Last month, I had the privilege of helping someone rebuild her home in South Carolina a few years after a hurricane damaged it. As we were gathered here last Sunday, twelve volunteers with our Brethren *Children's Disaster Services* answered their call and traveled to Texas to serve children and families in area Red Cross shelters. Twelve more have since joined them. In a way, we are there with these caregivers. Also, *Gift of the heart kits*, some of which we prepared, are on their way. More, however, are needed... Lastly, money we raised through our district's *Disaster Response Auction* is being put to use as I speak. If you wish to send more right now, the quickest way is through our denominational website (www.brethren.org).

As members of a caring community, our Church of the Brethren is offering our prayers, Creator God, for the thousands of people affected by Hurricane Harvey in Texas and Louisiana. May you comfort those who mourn, those who are injured, and those who have lost their homes. May you protect them from despair, disease, and further destruction. We beseech you for strength and safety for all the workers and volunteers giving aid to others.

As believers in neighborly love, we pray that our giving may be generous, swift, and beneficial. We ask for wisdom in relief and recovery efforts, that compassion and practical help lift the spirits and hope of those whose homes, workplaces and schools are so deeply affected. Loving Lord, we ask for protection of the emergency workers and engineers who labor to save the dams and dikes and roadways and begin the huge recovery efforts.

We offer our prayers for the Children's Disaster Services (CDS) volunteers who are serving the displaced families affected by the hurricane. We think of the first twelve volunteers in San Antonio, Texas, rerouted when the Houston airport was closed. We ask for traveling mercies as additional volunteers travel to Texas to join our Brethren teams.

God you see suffering throughout our world. While our Texas disaster absorbs news, Bangladesh is under water in the most serious in floods in decades. Nearly a million homes are partially or totally destroyed and up to a third of its terrain -- much of it farmland -- left submerged. Crops and buildings are also monsoon damaged in India and Nepal. We extend our hearts and prayers to the millions of people experiencing weeks of severe flooding in south Asia with disease, loss of work, and food insecurity plaguing these regions where 41 million people are affected.

Together we implore you, God, to ease the flooding. We ask the Holy Spirit for comfort and healing. We reach out in prayer and with our donations for survival and recovery, just as Jesus healed the broken hearted and the early Christians reached out to share their fortunes with others. Today we pray for generosity and wisdom in discerning how we and our Faith communities can respond to these tragedies in the coming months.
