Our Tithes and Offerings

- P Jesus once said, "Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." (Matthew 7:7-8*)
- M A familiar Easter activity for children of all ages is the "hide and seek" of special eggs. It's fun to prepare, a joy in which adults can participate and relive younger years. And who is this "Easter Bunny" who places the eggs in interesting locations for little ones to find? Might you recognize him or her if you caught a glimpse?

(if there are children:)

M - There are some eggs hidden in the front of our sanctuary. I see some children who might be interested in searching for and finding them. So, let me ask if you'd like to join me now to discover where they might be and what we might learn through them.

(M quietly welcomes children up front to find eggs during the Offertory, while P continues. If there are no children, P & M read alternating paragraphs of the rest)

P - I can hear some old folks saying in their heads, "Worship is not a place for Easter Bunnies," and they would be right ... to a point. But seeking and finding, asking and receiving, and knocking and having doors opened is part of the gospel. In fact, the surprise of the real Easter can be lost on us if we don't look intently, lift up our questions, and ring heaven's doorbell for it. I hope that's one reason you are here today.

 $P_{\text{(or M)}}$ - Remember the woman in Jesus' parable who swept her house clean searching for a lost coin? That story flows in so

many directions, one being that here is a picture of God seeking us — like that woman, or like a child hunting for an egg. God will not rest until we are found. The giving of our tithes and offerings flows out of this sense of God reaching out to us first, knocking on our doors seeking entrance. When the Lord enters, we seek to share the best of what we have for our holy guest.

P - As you place your gift in the plate (and as the children seek and find), imagine gratefully being a good host to God our guest. "Here, Lord, may you be welcome in my home and heart." Ushers, help us to do this...

The Easter Story in twelve plastic eggs

Egg 1: The Bread

They made thorn branches into a crown and placed a stick in his hand as a staff and knelt before him...making fun of him saying, "Hail, King of the Jews."

Egg 6: The Cross

Carrying his own cross, he had to walk to where he would be crucified.

Egg 7: The Nails

The soldiers nailed Jesus to the cross

Egg 8: The Dice

The soldiers divided Jesus' clothes among them. With the robe still left, they rolled dice to see whom would get the robe.

Egg 9: The Sponge

While hanging on the cross, Jesus was offered sour wine on a sponge.

Egg 10: The Piercing of Jesus' side

After Jesus was dead, one of the soldiers pierced Jesus' side with a sword and it rushed blood and water.

Egg 11: The Rock

Jesus' body was wrapped in linen and placed in a tomb that was sealed with a rock

Egg 12: The Empty Tomb

Three days later, the rock was rolled away. Jesus was not there, he was Risen.

- 1 Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark,

- 1 Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together,
- 2 but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in.
- 1 Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself.
- 2 Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead.
- 1 Then the disciples returned to their homes.
- 2 But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet.
- 1 They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?"
- 2 She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him."

- 1 When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there,
- 2 but she did not know that it was Jesus.
- 1 Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?"
- 2 Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away."
- 1 Jesus said to her, "Mary!"
- 2 She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher).
- 1 Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.""
- 2 Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.
