God's Commandment

Deuteronomy 5:12-15

So, then, what about this resting day, the Sabbath? Listen to this commandment from the law of Moses. The setting is ancient, speaking to a day when animals provided transportation and labor, when slavery was part of the equation, when towns were few and far between, and when the memory of bondage in Egypt was fresh. Listen for how the core of this Word might apply to our setting.

12 Observe the sabbath day and keep it holy, as the LORD your God commanded you. 13 Six days you shall labor and do all your work. 14 But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, or your son or your daughter, or your male or female slave, or your ox or your donkey, or any of your livestock, or the resident alien in your towns, so that your male and female slave may rest as well as you. 15 Remember that you were a slave in the land of Egypt, and the LORD your God brought you out from there with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm; therefore the LORD your God commanded you to keep the sabbath day.

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Returning our Offerings

As you return your offering, ponder this commandment which calls us to rest on the Sabbath, as God rested on the seventh day of Creation. Be creative. Think of what provides rest to you. Come up with some ideas to share during Pete's message about what might help us to rest on the Sabbath.

Gospel

Mark 2:23-28

Our Gospel reading this morning is divided into two parts, though one immediately follows the other in the good news according to Mark. These Sabbath stories are told together by Matthew and Luke, also. Listen.

²³ One sabbath Jesus was going through the grainfields; and as they made their way his disciples began to pluck heads of grain. ²⁴ The Pharisees said to him, "Look, why are they doing what is not lawful on the sabbath?" ²⁵ And he said to them, "Have you never read what David did when he and his companions were hungry and in need of food? ²⁶ He entered the house of God, when Abiathar was high priest, and ate the bread of the Presence, which it is not lawful for any but the priests to eat, and he gave some to his companions." ²⁷ Then he said to them, "The sabbath was made for humankind, and not humankind for the sabbath; ²⁸ so the Son of Man is lord even of the sabbath."

Praying with words
