Nehemiah 8:1-10

- P By the time the seventh month arrived, the People of Israel were settled in their towns. Then all the people gathered as one person in the town square in front of the Water Gate and asked the scholar Ezra to bring the Book of The Revelation of Moses that God had commanded for Israel.
- G So Ezra the priest brought The Revelation to the congregation, which was made up of both men and women—everyone capable of understanding. It was the first day of the seventh month. He read it facing the town square at the Water Gate from early dawn until noon in the hearing of the men and women, all who could understand it. And all the people listened—they were all ears—to the Book of The Revelation.
- P The scholar Ezra stood on a wooden platform constructed for the occasion. He was flanked on the right by Mattithiah, Shema, Anaiah, Uriah, Hilkiah, and Maaseiah, and on the left by Pedaiah, Mishael, Malkijah, Hashum, Hashbaddanah, Zechariah, and Meshullam.
- G Ezra opened the book. Every eye was on him (he was standing on the raised platform) and as he opened the book everyone stood.
- P Indeed, let everyone gathered here this morning stand. (congregation does so)
- G Then Ezra praised God, the great God, and all the people responded, "Oh Yes! Yes!" with hands raised high.
- P Indeed, let everyone gathered here this morning raise your hands and repeat, "Oh Yes! Yes!" (congregation does so)

- G And then they fell to their knees in worship of God, their faces to the ground.
- P Indeed, let everyone gathered here this morning ... well ... sit down.
- G Jeshua, Bani, Sherebiah, Jamin, Akkub, Shabbethai, Hodiah, Maaseiah, Kelita, Azariah, Jozabad, Hanan, and Pelaiah, all Levites, explained The Revelation while people stood, listening respectfully.
- P Indeed, let everyone gathered here this morning stand up again.
- G They translated the Book of The Revelation of God so the people could understand it and then explained the reading.
- P Nehemiah the governor, along with Ezra the priest and scholar and the Levites who were teaching the people, said to all the people,
- G "This day is holy to God, your God. Don't weep and carry on."
- P They said this because all the people were weeping as they heard the words of The Revelation... He continued,
- G "Go home and prepare a feast, holiday food and drink; and share it with those who don't have anything: This day is holy to God. Don't feel bad. The joy of God is your strength!"
- P Indeed, let everyone gathered here this morning say, "The joy of the Lord is our strength!" (congregation does so)

- G Be seated. *(pause)* "The joy of the Lord is our strength!" Some of us remember those words as a song for children.
- P This encouragement comes from a season in the Bible of rebuilding a broken-down city,
- G and specifically a day of listening and responding to what God had long ago revealed to Moses.
- P This holy day this holiday was not a time to mourn over brokenness,
- G but rather a time to rejoice in the loving-kindness of the Lord. It was a celebration.
- P And the invitation of Nehemiah and Ezra and the priests was to enjoy a thanksgiving feast.
- G In the process, God's people were to joyfully share what they had with those who needed, so that all would be fed.
- P With that in mind, we take time this morning...
- G a day for listening to what God might reveal through Word and Spirit...
- P we pause just now to share our offerings.
- G As we do so, we remember, "The joy of the Lord is our strength!"

I Corinthians 12:12-31

- G For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.
- P For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body— Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.
- G Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say,
- P "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,"
- G that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say,
- P "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,"
- G that would not make it any less a part of the body.
- P If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be?
- G If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be?
- P But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose.
- G If all were a single member, where would the body be?
- P As it is, there are many members, yet one body.
- G The eye cannot say to the hand,
- P "I have no need of you,"
- G nor again the head to the feet,
- P "I have no need of you."

- G On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable,
- P and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor,
- G and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this.
- P But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another.
- G If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.
- P Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it.
- G And God has appointed in the church first apostles,
- P second prophets,
- G third teachers;
- P then deeds of power,
- G then gifts of healing,
- P forms of assistance,
- G forms of leadership,
- P various kinds of tongues.
- G Are all apostles?
- P Are all prophets?
- G Are all teachers?
- P Do all work miracles?

- G Do all possess gifts of healing?
- P Do all speak in tongues?
- G Do all interpret?
- P But strive for the greater gifts.
- G And I will show you a still more excellent way.
